The statute from the CA code of Regulations California Veterinary Medicine Practice Act 2005 edition Sect 2038 Musculoskeletal Manipulation

- a) the term musculoskeletal manipulation (MSM) is the system of the application of mechanical forces applied mechanically . . or through any device to . . . prevent, cure or relieve impaired function . . when performed on animals constitutes the practice of veterinary medicine
- (b) MSM may only be performed by
- (1) a veterinarian (..... requires an exam, diagnosis, treatment plan and the authorization of owner, record keeping including a signed acknowledgement from the owner that MSM is considered to be and alternative/nonstandard therapy.)
- (2) a CA licensed doctor of chiropractic working under the direct supervision of a veterinarian

Direct supervision is then defined:

- (A) the veterinarian has diagnosed, judged the need, prescribed the treatment, kept the record and obtained the signed document as defined above in (b)(1)
- (B) the chiropractor then examines the animal and consults with the veterinarian and they agree on the treatment
- (C) the MSM is performed either within the small animal hospital and the veterinarian is on the premises OR the MSM is performed upon a large animal in the field and the supervising veterinarian is in the general vicinity
- (D) the veterinarian ensures accurate and complete records of MSM treatments are maintained
- (E) if the supervising veterinarian has ceased the relationship with the chiropractor the chiropractor shall immediately terminate such treatment

A veterinarian who fails to conform with the provisions of this section when authorizing a chiropractor to evaluate or perform MSM treatments upon an animal shall be deemed to have engaged in unprofessional conduct.
